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Faithfulness in Little Things

As the children of God, we must not lose sight of the fact that we are here on trial, and that we are ourselves deciding our own destiny for everlasting happiness or for eternal death. We have everything to gain or to lose. We each have a work before us. We must cooperate with God in reaching the Bible

standard, in conforming to His will. In these precious hours of probation, God desires that we shall form such characters as we shall wish we had perfected, when Christ shall appear the second time without sin unto salvation.

Christ has given Himself for His church “that he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, that he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish” (Ephesians 5:26, 27).

The apostle Paul says: “I thank my God always on your behalf, for the grace of God which is given you by Jesus Christ; that in every thing ye are enriched by him, in all



utterance, and in all knowledge; even as the testimony of Christ was confirmed in you: so that ye come behind in no gift; waiting for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ: who shall also confirm you unto the end, that ye may be blameless in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 1:4-8). There is need to cultivate every grace that Jesus, through His sufferings and death, has brought within our reach; for that grace alone can remedy our defects; Christ alone can transform the character. And God would have us manifest this grace, so richly provided, in the little as well as the large things of life.

If you would skillfully cultivate and train your flowers, you must consult a gardener; for he understands the work, he trains them to grow how and where he will. He gives them plenty of water, sunshine, and air, and digs about their roots. Day by day he works, not by violent efforts, but by little acts constantly repeated, until he can train shrub and flower into perfect form and beauty. Thus the grace of Christ works upon the human mind and heart as an educator. The continued influence of His Spirit trains the soul, molding the character after the divine Model.

Our entire life is God's and must be used to His glory. His grace will consecrate and improve every

faculty. Let no one say, I cannot remedy my defects of character; for if you come to this decision, you will certainly fail to obtain everlasting life. The impossibility lies in your own will. If you **will** not, then you cannot overcome. The real difficulty arises from the corruption of unsanctified hearts, and an unwillingness to submit to the control of God.

Some youth are much opposed to order and discipline. They do not respect the rules of the home by rising at a regular hour. They lie in bed some hours after daylight, when everyone should be astir. They burn the midnight oil, depending upon artificial light to

supply the place of the light that nature has provided at seasonable hours. In so doing they not only waste precious



opportunities, but cause additional expense. But in almost every case the plea is made, "I cannot get through my work; I have something to do; I cannot retire early." Thus they are sleeping soundly when they should be awake with nature and the early rising birds. The precious habits of order are broken; and the moments thus idled away in the early morning set things out of course for the whole day.

Our God is a God of order, and He desires that His children shall *will* to bring themselves into order and under His discipline. Would it not be better, therefore, to break up this habit of turning night into day, and the fresh hours of the morning into night. If the youth would form habits of regularity and order, they would improve in health, in spirits, in memory, and in disposition.

It is the duty of all to observe strict rules in their habits of life. This is for your own good, dear youth, both physically and morally. When you rise in the morning, take into consideration, as far as possible, the work you must accomplish during the day. If necessary, have a small book in which to jot down the things that need to be done, and set yourself a time in which to do your work. If it is the work of the bedrooms, see that the rooms have a proper airing, that the bedclothes are separated, and that the entire room is freshened with air and sunshine. Allow yourself a certain

time in which to perform this work. Do not sit down while it is yet unfinished to read any paper or book that may interest you but say, I must do this work in the given time.

Your room may contain many little ornaments placed there for admiration; but if you would have an eye single to the glory of God, you would do well to pack away these little idols. In handling, dusting, and replacing them, many precious moments are spent that might be employed in needful work. But if these trinkets are not to be stored away, then you have another lesson to learn. Be expeditious. Do not dreamily take up every article and keep it in your hand, as though loath to lay it down. It is the duty of those who are slow in their movements to improve in this respect. The Lord has said, "Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord" (Romans 12:11). In preparing the meals, make your calculations, giving yourself all the time that you know by experience you will require in order to cook the food thoroughly and place it upon the table at the proper time. But it is better to be ready five minutes before the time than to be five minutes late. In washing dishes, also, the work may be done with dispatch, and yet with care and thoroughness. Slow, dilatory habits make much work out of very little. But if you will, you may overcome these fussy, lingering habits. The exercise of the will power will

make the hands move deftly.

When I have been searching for a girl to help with my housework, certain young persons have been recommended to me. But when I inquired of those who had previously employed them, the reply was, concerning one: "She will not suit you; she is very slow. You will have to pay your money for having your work done in a slovenly manner, and you will feel that it is money wasted." Of another it was said: "She has no method; she has not cultivated caretaking. She needs someone beside her; for she has not breadth of mind enough to comprehend the situation, to understand how one thing after another should be done, nor to use tact in her housekeeping." I was warned against employing another because, while everything was in disorder, she would sit down in the midst of her unfinished work, and with newspaper or book in hand, forget all about her duties. Of still another who I thought would please me, I learned that she was untidy. Another was disrespectful. For persons to whom she took a violent fancy, she would show great consideration, going to any lengths in order to receive their

approbation and flattery. But she had no reverence or even respect for anyone else. "But," I reasoned, "if she is a Christian, she will surely take counsel." An expression of sorrow came over the countenance of my friend as she replied: "I am afraid you will be disappointed in her. If you insist upon having things done as you wish, if you plainly set before her the mistakes she is making, instead of correcting them, she will say that she does the best she can and will take upon her the air of one who has been much injured. She does not respect those in authority but will have a sneer in her mind, which, if not revealed to you in words, will be manifest in her expression. Her opinions, too, are not kept secret but expressed freely to



others. I have myself been compelled to live over this experience, to my sorrow." Another will spend not only minutes but hours of the day, in needless talk, and thus squanders much precious time.

These matters have been looked upon as little things and almost unworthy of notice. But many are deceived as to the importance of these little things. They bear strongly upon the great whole. God does not regard anything as unimportant that pertains to the well-being of the human family. He gave His only begotten Son for the body as well as for the soul, and all is to be consecrated to Him.

Let there be a determined purpose to overcome and to cultivate those habits that are desirable. This work requires ceaseless watchfulness, and steady, persevering effort. But this adherence to right practices in little things is a discipline of self that will become less difficult in proportion as the heart is sanctified by the grace of God. Earnest, persevering effort will place you on the vantage ground of victory.

"Watch ye therefore, and pray always, that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things that shall come to pass, and to stand before the Son of man" (Luke 21:36). Can you, dear youth, look forward with joyful hope and expectation to the time when the Lord, your righteous Judge, shall

confess your name before the Father and before the holy angels? The very best preparation you can have for Christ's second appearing is to rest with firm faith in the great salvation brought to us at His first coming. You must believe in Christ as a personal Saviour, and that He was once offered to bear the sins of many; that His love, abiding in your soul as a living, active agency to correct, refine, and purify your ways and practices, may save you from your errors.

The Lord is not pleased to have His children disorderly; to have their lives marred with defects, their religious experience crippled, and their growth in grace dwarfed by hereditary and cultivated deficiencies. These defects will be copied by others and thus be reproduced and multiplied. Listen to the words of God, spoken through His servant John, coming down through the ages to our own time: "Every man that hath this hope in him purifieth himself, even as he is pure" (1 John 3:3). Great truth can be brought into little things; practical religion must be carried into the lowly duties of daily life. And in the performance of these duties, you are forming characters that will stand the test of the Judgment. Then, in whatever position you may be placed, whatever your duties may be, do them nobly and faithfully, realizing that all heaven is beholding your work.—*The Youth's Instructor*, January 28, 1897.

STRENGTH SCRIPTURE IN

I would love to be able to genuinely say that in every single phase of my life I have had the deepest desire to read my Bible every day. But if I am to be honest, that hasn't always been the case. If I am to be honest, I have to own up to having gone days without reading my Bible.

True, I may have read the Bible from cover to cover before, but just like my physical body, my soul also needs consistent feeding, and the Bible is one of the most precious sources for my daily bread. I know all of this, as I am sure you do, too.

Most of the time, the hardest part of reading the Bible isn't being convinced it is a habit we need. Oftentimes the hardest part is forming the habit of taking the time to read. Every day the to-do list gets longer and longer, and setting aside time for devotions gets pushed lower and lower on that list. Other times, we just don't feel like reading the Bible anymore.

Then when we finally do sit down to read, we're faced with not knowing where to begin!

While it makes sense to start at the beginning, Genesis, it doesn't always have to be that way. In my experience in delving back into the Bible, I have come across 5 books that have helped me restore my Bible-reading habits, and I'm sharing them below in no particular order. Who knows, maybe they'll provide a place for you to start, too.



It was probably quite predictable to see the psalms in this list, wasn't it? The book of Psalms is filled with the most heart-wrenching cries for help that I have found often echo my own worries and despair:

"I will say unto God my rock,
Why hast thou forgotten me? why

go I mourning because of the oppression of the enemy?" (Psalm 42:9).

The psalmist struggled with lack of faith and the weakness engraved in our humanity, and his psalms often begin with statements declaring his anguish. But the beauty of the book of Psalms is that in the same chapter the psalmist will finish with hope, praising God for His continual mercy, grace, patience, and understanding towards humanity.

Don't be discouraged; while the book itself may be long, the chapters provide concise, relatable, and uplifting "pick-me-ups" for the soul.

"Hope thou in God: for I shall yet praise him, who is the health of my countenance, and my God" (verse 11).

"My flesh and my heart faileth: but God is the strength of my heart, and my portion for ever" (Psalm 73:26, emphasis added).



Reading Esther has always been a spiritual experience for me, because as a child I always felt Esther was included in the Bible just for me. It was the perfect love story, with elements of comedic irony, and a satisfying amount of description.

Every time I would begin to read Esther and was met with the detailed descriptions, I felt as if the book were a love letter from God just to me.

It felt like proof that He knew how much I enjoy narratives, and He inspired each word just for me. I always read Esther in one sitting. It is a book that warms my heart and inspires my spirit. Who isn't inspired to pursue the faith it takes to make Esther's words, "If I perish, I perish" (Esther 4:16) his or

her own when it comes to keeping God's commandments?

Esther may not have the same effect on you. The point is to substitute here any book with which you have connected in the past. Perhaps when you first began reading the Bible, it was one of the Gospels that made you feel closer to God.

When we feel like reading the Bible the least, that's when we need it the most. Sometimes it can be easier to read something familiar. Your favorite book is a good place to start.

If you don't have one yet, start with mine and keep reading; you'll find yours soon.



Oftentimes, the fact that I don't want to read the Bible is a sure sign that reading it is exactly what I need to do. It's usually a sign of wavering faith. Hebrews feeds faith. Chapter 11 is a well-known chapter dubbed the "Faith Chapter." However, all of Hebrews talks about God's efforts to personally address His people, to the point He sent down the greatest form of communication of love—His Son.

Hebrews, like the rest of the Bible, is a book with so much underlying meaning that it can be read over and over again, and

it will grow deeper and deeper in meaning with each read.

"Wherefore (as the Holy Ghost saith, To day if ye will hear his voice, harden not your hearts)" (Hebrews 3:7, 8).



First John is often one of the first books we suggest to those unfamiliar with the gospel, and with good reason. It's a letter whose theme is that of the Father's love. It simultaneously exhorts the reader to forsake the world and cling to the Saviour, while giving the best reason to do so—divine love.

"Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God" (1 John 3:1, emphasis added).



James is about putting things into perspective. It is about realizing that temptations mean we are growing in faith, and that one of our greatest battles will be the battle against self. It's about realizing our full dependency upon God.

"For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little

time, and then vanisheth away”
(James 4:14).

There is another strong theme throughout James—that of love in the community. The entire book is addressed to a church body, and it serves as a reminder to each of its members to love, respect, and refrain from judging one another, and that even the most unassuming member has an important role to play. James also places an important emphasis on love through actions, which speak to true character.

“Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world”
(James 1:27).

There you have it—my 5 books to read when I don’t quite feel like reading the Bible. However, there are also two key things to

remember before reading and making Bible-reading a habit:

Always pray before reading so that God may guide you and your understanding.

Set apart a time that you know will work for you. For instance, for many people it works to read in the morning before they begin their daily activities. For me it’s the opposite. I can focus better when my day is winding down. Find what works for you and stick to it.

Of course, the most important thing is to read and engage in communion with Christ. The books I mentioned may have given you a place to start, but there’s no rule on which book to read first. After all, there are messages in all of them just waiting to find their way into your heart.

some answer of his own. Instead, he humbly trusted God. With his three friends, Daniel asked God to explain what the king had forgotten, and God rewarded the prayers of his servant. Then “Daniel went in unto Arioch, whom the king had ordained to destroy the wise men of Babylon: he went and said thus unto him; Destroy not the wise men of Babylon: bring me in before the king, and I will shew unto the king the interpretation” (Daniel 2:24).

Dear reader, how do you react when someone happens to threaten you? Are you as calm as Daniel was? Do you know that God will answer your prayers? In 1 John 5:14, 15, He promises to hear your prayers, “And we have an assured confidence that whenever we ask anything in accordance with His will, He listens to us. And since we know that He listens to us, then whatever we ask, we know that we have the things which we have asked from Him” (Richard F. Weymouth, *The New Testament in Modern Speech*).

When Daniel was brought before the king, he said, "The secret which the king hath demanded cannot the wise men, the astrologers, the magicians, the soothsayers, shew unto the king; but there is a God in heaven that revealeth secrets, and maketh known to the king Nebuchadnezzar what shall be in the latter days. Thy dream, and the visions of thy head upon thy bed, are these; as for thee, O king, thy thoughts came into thy mind upon thy bed, what should come to pass hereafter: and he that revealeth secrets maketh known to thee what shall come to pass. But as for me, this secret is not revealed to me for any wisdom that I have more than any living, but for their sakes that shall make known the interpretation to the king, and that thou mightest know the thoughts of thy heart. Thou, O king, sawest, and beheld a great image. This great image, whose brightness was excellent, stood before thee; and the form thereof was terrible. This image's head was of fine gold, his breast and his arms of silver, his belly and his thighs of brass, his legs of iron, his feet part of iron and part of clay. Thou sawest till that a stone was cut out without hands, which smote the image upon his feet that were of iron and clay, and brake them to pieces. Then was the iron, the clay, the brass, the silver, and the gold, broken to pieces together, and became like the chaff of the

summer threshingfloors; and the wind carried them away, that no place was found for them: and the stone that smote the image became a great mountain, and filled the whole earth. This is the dream; and we will tell the interpretation thereof before the king. Thou, O king, art a king of kings: for the God of heaven hath given thee a kingdom, power, and strength, and glory. And wheresoever the children of men dwell, the beasts of the field and the fowls of the heaven hath he given into thine hand, and hath made thee ruler over them all. Thou art this head of gold. And after thee shall arise another kingdom inferior to thee, and another third kingdom of brass, which shall bear rule over all the earth. And the fourth kingdom shall be strong as iron: forasmuch as iron breaketh in pieces and subdueth all things: and as iron that breaketh all these, shall it break in pieces and bruise. And whereas thou sawest the feet and toes, part of potters' clay, and part of iron, the kingdom shall

be divided; but there shall be in it of the strength of the iron, forasmuch as thou sawest the iron mixed with miry clay. And as the toes of the feet were part of iron, and part of clay, so the kingdom shall be partly strong, and partly broken. And whereas thou sawest iron mixed with miry clay, they shall mingle themselves with the seed of men: but they shall not cleave one to another, even as iron is not mixed with clay. And in the days of these [divided] kings shall the God of heaven set up a kingdom, which shall never be destroyed: and the kingdom shall not be left to other people, but it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand for ever. 6. The stone that destroys the image.

How many empires do we find in history and prophecy since Nebuchadnezzar? Six:

1. Babylon.
2. Followed by Medo-Persia.
3. Followed by Greece.
4. Followed by Rome.
5. Followed by the ten divisions of the Roman Empire.

A few years ago, my family and I had been in New Zealand for a few months with relatives. We had to get some close friends to look after our animals while we were away—and that included our two big dogs, Bobby and Charlie.

When we came back, we got all our animals back and started settling back to our normal life. It all started early one morning, the day after we got our dogs back. My younger brother

had taken the dogs for a walk on our 5-acre property. Since we had not been home for a while, the grass had not been cut, so it was very long. My mother, sisters, and I were just getting out of bed, when we heard Matthew, my younger brother, calling, “Something is wrong with Bobby.” Immediately we were all out of the house to see what the problem was. When I saw Bobby, he was foaming at the

mouth, his head was swollen, and his back legs were

becoming paralyzed. By now we knew something was very wrong. From what we could tell by the symptoms, he had been bitten by a snake.

Trying to think of something that might save our dog, the only thing I could think of was activated charcoal. I ran back

to the house and got some charcoal and milk. We tried to give Bobby some of the charcoal, but by now he





could not swallow. He was totally paralyzed, He could not move at all. There was nothing else we could do. The vet was too far away (since we live in the country), so my mother said we would have to say good-bye to our dog. We were all in tears. . . .

That's when my youngest sister, Jasmine, who was only 5 at the time, said to my mother, "Mummy, we should pray" so we all said a heartfelt prayer for our dog, asking God if it would be His will, to let our dog live. After we prayed, Bobby started moving his head a little. At first we just thought it was the sign of the end, but then Bobby started moving his front feet. Within just a few minutes, Bobby started moving his whole body. That was when a spark of hope was in our hearts that God

had answered our prayers. . . . Within about 10 minutes, Bobby was walking around like nothing had happened! Still to this day we have our dog, and we thank God daily for this miracle.

The story does not finish there. A few days later, my father and brothers found a 2-plus-meter (about 7-foot), Eastern Brown snake caught in some wire fence. For a little knowledge on the Eastern Brown snake, it is the second most poisonous snake in the world. Most humans and animals do not live if they are bitten by this snake. It is a miracle that our dog is still alive today. Every time I look at Bobby it reminds me of that day and how much God loves and protects us—and answers even our little prayers! 🍷

The Sour Side of Vinegar

The term “vinegar” is derived from the French *vin aigre*, which literally means “sour wine.” Traditionally, it was fermented over a period of several weeks or longer, thus producing acetic acid bacteria. Different colors of vinegar occur as a result of whatever produce has been fermented. Apple cider vinegar, for example, is derived from rotten apples—although it is often touted as a health remedy.

Popular remedies come and go, but whatever we decide about them, our first priority must be to check the Spirit of Prophecy to see whether or not the latest health fad is in harmony with the principles kindly provided to us by our all-knowing Creator. Let’s see:

“[When] salads are prepared with oil and vinegar, fermentation takes place in the stomach, and the food does not digest but decays or putrefies. As a consequence the blood

is not nourished but becomes filled with impurities, and liver and kidney difficulty appear. Heart disturbances, inflammation, and many evils are the result of such kind of treatment, and not only are the bodies affected, but the morals, the religious life, are affected.”—*Manuscript Releases*, vol. 2, pp. 143, 144.

What advice did Ellen White give to a friend struggling with the habit of indulging in vinegar—practical advice which can apply to all types of vices pertaining to appetite?

“Discard everything that would cause you to do halfway work in seeking the kingdom of God and His righteousness. Put away every indulgence that would hinder you in the work of overcoming. Ask for the prayers of those who can comprehend your need of help.

“There was a time when I was in a situation similar in some respects to yours. I had indulged the desire for vinegar. But I resolved with the help of God to overcome this appetite. I fought the temptation, determined not to be mastered by this habit.

“For weeks I was very sick; but I kept saying over and over, The Lord knows all about it. If I die, I die; but I will not yield to this desire. The struggle continued, and I was sorely afflicted for many weeks. All thought that it was impossible for me to live. You may be sure we sought the Lord very earnestly. The most fervent prayers were offered

for my recovery. I continued to resist the desire for vinegar, and at last I conquered. Now I have no inclination to taste anything of the kind. This experience has been of great value to me in many ways. I obtained a complete victory.

“I relate this experience to you for your help and encouragement. I have faith, my sister, that you can come through this trial, and reveal that God is the helper of His children in every time of need. If you determine to conquer this habit and will fight it perseveringly, you can obtain an experience of the highest value. When you set your will resolutely to break off this indulgence, you will have the help you need from God. Try it, my sister.

“As long as you acknowledge this habit by indulging it, Satan will retain his hold on your will and bring it into obedience to himself. But if you will determine to overcome, the Lord will heal you and will give you strength to resist every temptation. Ever remember that Christ is your Saviour and Keeper.”—*Counsels on Diet and Foods*, pp. 484, 485.


